South Korean pianist Sun Min Kim serves as Coordinator of Keyboard Studies and Assistant

Professor of Music at Denison University. He made his début with the Ulsan Symphony

Orchestra at age 13, performing Grieg's Piano Concerto. He has been a prizewinner of national

and international competitions such as the Maria Canals International Piano Competition,

Bradshaw & Buono International Piano Competition, MTNA, International Crescendo Music

Awards, Brevard Music Center Solo Piano Competition, Harold Protsman Piano Competition,

Competition of the Society for American Musicians, and Lee Biennial Piano Competition.

In 2008, the professional music fraternity Mu Phi Epsilon awarded him the Sterling Achievement

Award, the highest honor that the fraternity bestows upon its collegiate members. As a laureate of various awards, he debuted at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall, Merkin Concert Hall, and other prestigious venues across the United States and abroad.

He has frequently performed solo and chamber music at festivals such as Aspen Music Festival, Banff Center, Brevard Music Center, Piano Texas, Prague International Piano Masterclass, Quartet Program, and École Redaille in Belgium.

Sun Min is an active lecturer, competition juror, and masterclass presenter. His current and

former students have been prizewinners of national and international piano competitions. Sun Min Kim completed the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Piano Performance and Literature with a minor in Collaborative Piano at the Eastman School of Music, where he studied with and served as teaching assistant for Nelita True. He studied accompanying and chamber music with Jean Barr. Sun Min has previously taught at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Oklahoma State University, and University of Rochester.

### **Certification**

Congratulations to our newest nationally certified member, Dr. Stephanie Webster-Cheng, NCTM, who enjoys an active career as an educator, collaborative pianist, and accompanist in Columbus. Stephanie, a graduate of the Interlochen Arts Academy, holds a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance from Lawrence University, and both a Master's and Doctorate degree in ethnomusicology from the University of Pittsburgh. She has received piano

instruction from Dr. Michael Coonrod, Dr. Michael Kim, and Dr. Anthony Padilla, and studied chamber music with The Ahn Trio.

Stephanie has taught piano for over 20 years to students in Michigan, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and Ohio. She currently teaches students ages 5 and up in her home studio located in Upper Arlington, SWC Piano, LLC. In addition to private piano lessons, Stephanie has taught college-level group piano and World Music courses at the University of Pittsburgh. Stephanie recently accepted the position of Publicity Chair for the Central East District of the Ohio Music Teachers Association. She has also served our students by judging at Scale Olympics and Pianorama auditions and conducting Level 4 students at the 2023 Pianorama. An



active member of the Ohio Federation of Music Clubs (OFMC), she chairs the Donald Babcock Junior Composer's Contest for young Ohio composers.

When not teaching, Stephanie enjoys reading and performing collaboratively with her musical children and their friends. She also tap dances and composes fun new piano music for her students in her free time. Kudos to Stephanie Webster-Cheng for completing the five projects required to become nationally certified by MTNA. She wrote this about National Certification:

## Why Certification? By Stephanie Webster-Cheng

I began looking into the MTNA certification process before the pandemic, but didn't actually commit to it until February of 2022. At the time, my studio had grown to almost capacity and I was excited to put my teaching and studio practices to paper, in a sense, sharing my passion for music education with others. I began working on Projects 1 (Teaching Philosophy), 4 (Positive Teaching Environment) and 5 (Ethical Practice and Business Policies).

Then my daughter's senior year started. As a cello performance major auditioning for the major college and conservatories on the East coast, my free time was spent helping her record, edit essays or travel to auditions. By springtime, one of my kids had a mental health crisis and I found myself in the middle of a divorce. Somehow in the midst of this, I was able to complete Project 3 (Teaching and Performance videos), but my progress had understandably halted and I wondered if I would ever complete the certification process.

This summer, I found myself with three weeks of unscheduled vacation time. I decided that this was my opportunity to finish the certification projects, which included revising my previous work and completing the four analysis pieces. I dove into the analysis, completing one piece a day, and actually found the process to be fun! (I am a music theorist at heart).



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When I finally submitted the fifty-page project in late July (and was approved shortly after), I realized that although I started the project in order to articulate and share my joy of teaching piano, I finished it as a gift to myself. I needed to show myself that I can do hard things, I can persevere through trials, and I can learn and grow as a teacher and musician.

In the end, this certification process gave me the gift of confidence, and also reminded me that I really love Western classical music history and analysis (I am now teaching an introduction class of this at Columbus State!)

I'd like to finish by saying a huge thank you to my colleagues who shared ideas via email or meetings at Graves, and to Janice Cook, who so kindly regularly checked in on my progress, offering her support and resources when I got stuck.

The MTNA Professional Certification Program exists to improve the level of professionalism within the field of music teaching. It benefits the members of the profession itself, as well as the public who interacts with the

professional. For the music teaching professional, certification provides prestige, recognition and the potential for student recruitment and increased earning power. For the public, certification helps readily identify competent music teachers in their communities.

## **Scale Olympics**

We are excited to announce that Scale Olympics 2024 will take place in-person at the Battelle Fine Arts Center at Otterbein University on October  $12^{th}$ , 2024.

Students in Scale Olympics may participate in up to nine events, including: Scales, Cadences, Arpeggios, Triads and Inversions, Sightreading, Harmonization, Transposition, Ear Training, and Theory. Students competing in fewer than 9 events earn individual ribbons for each event in which they participate. Students participating in all nine events may earn either a blue or a yellow rosette, depending on their scores in each event. The registration fee for students of CEOMTA members will be \$35 for 1-4 events, and \$37 for 5-9 events.

Like in 2022, students will complete the Ear Training and Theory tests online, prior to the student's arrival at Scale Olympics. This enables us to streamline the experience at Otterbein and helps us to make the best use of our judge pool.
